

Spellings - your child will be assigned a practice list made up of common exception words and the year 3/4 statutory word list on Spelling Shed on a weekly basis as part of their home learning. Children will complete investigations in class exploring the etymology and morphology of words within the context of their own writing.

Writing - This half term we will be focusing on developing children's knowledge and understanding of grammatical structures within our language. Alongside this, we will also have a daily focus on transcriptional elements of writing such as handwriting and spelling. Writing lessons will consist of practical activities to teach children about syntax, word classes and punctuation to ensure that all children can accurately identify sentence boundaries. Our first independent write will explore the features of a non-chronological report and link with our Enquiry topic.

Reading - Reading sessions will focus on developing children's vocabulary and understanding through discussion-based learning. We will explore a range of fiction and non-fiction texts throughout the half term. Children needing support with reading will benefit from small group story sessions which combine phonics strategies and reading fluency.

Autumn 1
Year 3 & 4: Where does the darkness come from?

As mainly Scientists, the children will be focussing on exploring light, shadows and how darkness is created. They will investigate light sources and reflections. They will need to understand that darkness is ever present and that it is the absence of light. This will lead to them creating, rehearsing and performing a shadow puppet story.

HUMANISM: How do non-religious people celebrate new life? During this unit, children will explore and understand how welcoming a new life is important for many people, but focusing specifically on Humanism as an example of non-religious worldviews.

Children should read five times a week, practise spellings as well as practise times tables and mental maths.

This half term, the children will be developing their understanding of place value, looking at partitioning numbers and comparing and ordering numbers. We will then be moving on to developing our addition and subtraction strategies.

How you can help at home? Help your child apply their maths in practical situations. Practice telling the time; times tables and recognising numbers around them.

It is really important for the children to be able to recall their times tables. Please use TTRD and other online games as well as practical fun ways at home to encourage your child to have these facts at their fingertips!

Optional Homework:

What can you find out about nocturnal animals?

Why do some animals prefer to sleep during the day and be awake at night? Present what you find out in any way that you would like to.

Optional Homework:

Write a poem about an exciting light source such as the stars, fireworks or glowing fire.

Optional Homework:

Put a toy on a piece of paper outside on a sunny day. Draw round the shadow of the toy. Repeat this again an hour later. Do this as many times as you can. How does the shape of the shadow change during the day?
